Our Activities - Government

Singapore Competent Authorities on Chemical Management

Several agencies which regulates hazardous chemicals with specific inherent properties and at different stages of their life cycle.

The **Ministry of Manpower (MOM)** regulates the exposure to chemicals at workplaces.



The National Environment Agency (NEA) regulates hazardous substances which are highly toxic and/or generates toxic wastes.



Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF) regulates the storing and transportation of flammable materials including petroleum.



Singapore Police Force (SPF) regulates the manufacture and storage of explosive precursors.
